

On any given day, there are nearly <u>424,000 children in foster care</u> in the United States. For children and youth who have experienced abuse or neglect, or for those who are at-risk of maltreatment, the social isolation and economic uncertainty brought on by COVID-19 has had far-reaching consequences—support networks disrupted, visits and court hearings delayed, a lack of technology for virtual learning, medical and/or therapy sessions, critically important services suspended and foster homes in short supply.

During these uncertain times, the National CASA/GAL Association for Children's member network of 948 state organizations and local programs remained resilient and continued to support children, youth and families. Advocacy didn't stop during COVID-19. Court appointed special advocate (CASA) and guardian ad litem (GAL) volunteers have demonstrated determination and creativity in staying connected with children by participating in remote hearings, providing virtual homework support, and celebrating milestone occasions. As these children begin to return to a sense of normalcy following the pandemic, having a caring, consistent adult—someone who checks in, follows up, holds the system accountable and puts the child's best interests before all others'—makes all the difference and helps change a child's story.
